

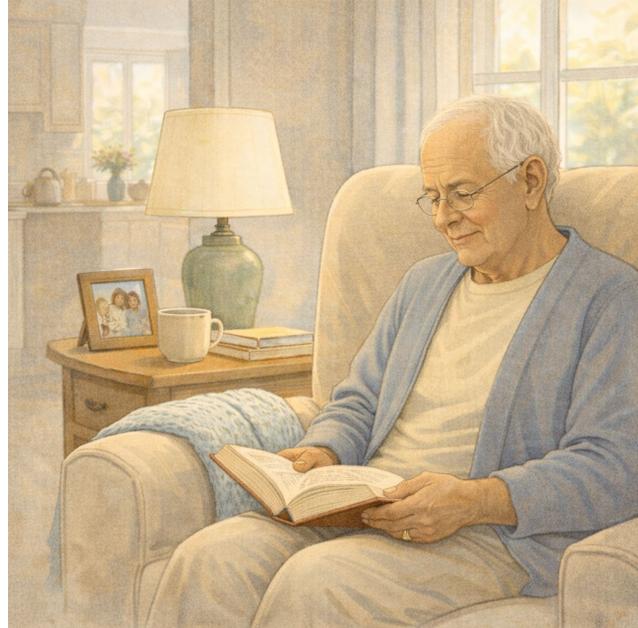
Awareness Between Visits For People Living With Dementia

What This Is

This document explains a complementary awareness option (Alerta Home) for families supporting a loved one living with dementia.

Dementia care specialists are often asked how families can stay informed between scheduled visits, or how to better understand when activity patterns may be changing for someone living with dementia.

Alerta Home is a passive awareness system that detects meaningful changes in movements, without cameras, recorders, or wearables.



Who This Is For

- Individuals living with dementia who live alone or who spend time alone during the day.
- Families with someone living with early to mid-stage dementia.
- Families with someone living with dementia who wanders.
- Families who value privacy and dignity.
- Families looking for observable patterns to try to delay premature escalation.

When Families Typically Consider This

- Calls are answered less consistently.
- Sleep-wake patterns seem to shift.
- Movement appears slower or less predictable.
- Family lives at a distance.
- The person with dementia resists visible technology or wearables.

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What This Is Not

- Replacement for caregivers, supervision, or clinical judgment.
- Caregiver performance monitor.
- Emergency response provider.
- Something that tells families what "change" means.
- Care recipient tracker in real-time.
- Alerta Home is intended to complement human care, not replace professional judgment or presence.
